What is PHM 2010:

Innovation from Bedside to Board Room?

PHM 2010 is the largest meeting of Pediatric Hospitalists of the year. It marks the 5th annual gathering and is sponsored by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the AAP Section on Hospital Medicine (SOHM), the Academic Pediatric Association (APA), and the Society of Hospital Medicine (SHM).

This year's theme of innovation speaks to the role that Pediatric Hospitalists play in pediatric care, every day and in the future, changing how care is provided to children through work done in patient rooms, conference rooms, and beyond.

Goal of the Activity

Pediatric Hospitalists provide leadership in the care of pediatric patients throughout the hospital. This includes significant roles in clinical medicine and medical education as well as roles in quality, research, hospital leadership, and business practice. The goal of PHM 2010 is to increase/enhance the participants' knowledge and competence in the areas of clinical medicine, practice management, education, quality, and research. Innovation in practice will be emphasized. The knowledge acquired will help individual hospitalists improve their practice and will also promote the necessary skills required to move the field of hospital medicine forward.
