21-Day Pediatrics Anti-Racism Challenge

Welcome to the Pediatric Antiracism Curriculum (PARC). PARC is adapted from the 21-Day Equity Habit Building Challenge[©] (link: https://www.eddiemoorejr.com/21daychallenge) created by social justice expert, Dr. Eddie Moore, Jr. The goal of the Challenge is to provide a framework for examining privilege, oppression, power, supremacy, and equity.

PARC focuses on the Black American experience. It includes a selection of readings, podcasts, and videos chosen to engage participants and challenge them into having difficult conversations. Designed by pediatric hospitalists, PARC includes a broad range of topics but importantly, items specific to medicine and pediatrics. Through education, reflection, and discussion, participants can start to build social justice habits.
